Greetings to the B. W. Harris Alumni Association in the United States of America and Congratulations and best wishes on the occasion of the celebration of your 13th Anniversary!!

The B. W. Harris Episcopal School in Monrovia is at the point where two roads diverge. We can continue the present trend of licking our past wounds and blaming all our troubles on the war, or we can set a course for new directions. It is more than physical structures that have been destroyed and more than books, benches, lab equipment and other tools of education that have been stolen, broken, or marred. The scars of the recent past are many and varied. The Alumni Association of the USA has been our partners in the fight to replace lost or damaged infrastructure and logistics. Now in addition to this we must embark on a decided campaign to redirect and renew the thought patterns of the next generation of Spartans.

The Board of Trustees has begun a process of <u>Institutional Reform</u> at B. W. Harris that will challenge you, BWHESAA, parents, students, faculty and staff. The process involves: a new student handbook, a new handbook for teachers, contractual agreements between staff and Board (as employer/employee) and a whole new approach that will move the Spartans out from the ordinary and set us apart. In some cases new staff and teachers will be employed who are able to meet the standards set by the Board. Many of the present staff and teachers will be replaced in the new academic year - especially those who bring no added value to the school. Dear Mrs. Aniteye:

I have received your letter requesting information regarding the general condition of the school, and your desire to assist us in whatever way you possibly can.

First of all, I would like to again thank the B. W. Harris Alumni Association of America for not only the concern, but the support that you all render the Institution. It is comforting to know, that even though you all have left the School, your hearts and support are still with us. We appreciate all that is done by the Association to keep the spirit alive at B. W. Harris.

You have requested the following:

1. A complete report indicating the extend of damage done to the building (property) along with pictures and/or a video tape where possible.

To the above, a survey was made regarding the extend of damages done and a video tape which is enclosed, was done. At the time of the video, we found three (3) rockets that had fallen on the premises, however, as we made temporary repairs on the roof, we found another rocket that had exploded in the roof, but had not fallen. This made a total of four (4) rockets that fell on the premises. We made a temporary situation on repairs by using a few tarpaulins to cover the damages in the roof in order to open school on October 20, 2003. Had we not done that, it WOULD NOT had been possible to open as we were in the raining season.

2. A copy of the school's budget.

A copy of the School's Budget is being faxed to you for your review. Unfortunately for the Institution, many students left the country during the war between what we Liberians refer to as, World War I, II and III. As a result of this, many families who left Liberia never came back. Many have resettled in neighboring countries as well as the United States and the enrollment has dropped. Because of this, it is very difficult for our Budget to support us as it has in the past.

3. Enrollment size and number of teachers/staff;

In the past, the classes had been overcrowded and the Board had requested that we limit the classes as follows:

- a) K I and K II we keep a combined total of 25 to 30 students. The reason for this, children at that age need more attention and care. Those are the formative years and very important in a child's life. Therefore, we must devote as much time and individual attention possible to insure that they get special care.
- b) Lower Elementary 25 30
- c) Upper Elementary 25 -30
- d) Junior High The Board has requested that a maximum of thirty (30) per class which makes it possible for students to ask questions and the teacher can still meet up with his/her Lesson Plan for the day.
- e) High School The Board has requested that a maximum of thirty-five (35) per class which also makes it possible for students to ask questions and the teacher can still meet up with his/her Lesson Plan for the day.

The total number of students we have enrolled this year happens to be 353. Last Academic Year 2002/2003, we had 499.

- 3. Number of teachers and staff;
- a) We have a total of 43 full time teachers, and 7 part time teachers. The part time teachers are for Electives which start each year at the second period.
- b) As for staff, we have a total of forty-three (43) which includes from the Acting Principal to the Janitors and security.

4. General conditions of the school, ie, physical facilities (bathrooms, labs, teaching equipment, chairs, books teaching aids, etc.

The physical facilities have already been discussed above in item one (1). Video to that effective is attached.

The B. W. Harris bathrooms are the BEST amongst all the school. We are in the process of preparing the broken chairs. Most of them have already been completed.

The library could do with some good Reference Books in the following areas: Biology, Chemistry, Math, Physics, General Science, Economics.

There are urgent needs to upgrade the Chemistry, Biology and Physics lab, this will be faxed later However, chemicals for the lab is so needed.

Teaching equipments - The K - I, K - II, Lower and Upper Elementary are in dire need of teaching and visual aids, readers/reading aids. For the reading skills, the following are suggested reading series. Scott Foresman, McGraw Hill, and Houghton Millsman. These series go from K I to six grade. For the French classes, they are requesting teaching aids including a good tape recorder. Not very large, to improve the quality of learning French. Hearing the recorded pronunciation and being able to follow with the reading materials which comes with it, will really make it easier for the students to learn.

As you are aware, OUR ENTIRE computer lab was taken away. As a result, we cannot offer computer this semester, and this is very important because most Institutions require that students must be computer literate. I have been told that in the States, often a company might get rid of computers that they feel are outdated at a low cost. Where they may be outdated for them, they are very useful for our purpose. This would be something to look into.

GENERATOR - This is an **urgent** need for the school. For some of the classes, depending on what the weather is like, it is very difficult for the students to see.

MIMEOGRAPHING MACHINE - This also very urgent. ALL of our exams are mimeographed. Teacher's and students grade sheets, as well as other documents

While almost everything is urgent, We would like to list our priorities in the following order:

- 1) Generator 25 -27 KVA
- 2) Mimeographing Machine
- 3) Computers, printers and software
- 4) Reading series and teaching aids
- 5) Reference books
- 6) Roof

I hope you can go over the above and whatever you all can do, will be highly appreciated. We again thank you all for your assistance.

Will be getting back to you shortly.
